supreme delight was to hear of trophies won for Christ through his ministry. After a few years as a Supernumerary he passed away in peace on January 12, 1918.

(26) JOHN J. INGRAM: born in London, June 29, 1851, of a family that yielded several members to the Christian ministry. In his early youth he joined the church at Liverpool Road. His intellectual force and deep religious devotion were marked by all who studied with him at Didsbury, and his career as a capable minister of the Word of Life was then forecast. At the root of his character and ministry was a living experience of evangelical truth, and all the powers of a logical mind and of incisive speech were consecrated to the exposition of the Gospel of the grace of God. The sermons he published—strong and well knit—are typical of his normal preaching, for he spared no pains in an exercise which was to him as the very breath of life. He had his being in the deep things of God, and reverted to them in converse with delight. His modesty was as notable as his mental power. His pastoral instincts were tender, and in the homes of his people he was a son of consolation. He was early in responsible charge as a superintendent, and with sacred care and genial fidelity cherished our Methodist traditions. The end of his life, when he settled as a Supernumerary at Sutton Coldfield, was a brave conflict with pain. On January 14, 1918, in the forty-third year of his ministry, he passed into paradise.

(27) THOMAS J. PRITCHARD: born at Eglwysfach, Cardiganshire, June 11, 1853, being the twin brother of the late Rev. Jacob Pritchard. Blessed with a godly home, he was converted at a very early age and immediately began his life of consecrated service. Accepted as a Candidate in 1873, he spent two years at Didsbury, where Dr. W. B. Pope exerted a powerful and abiding influence over his mind and character. He was a man of wide reading, always awake to the intellectual movements of the day, and possessed pulpit gifts of a very high degree. He was a true poet, and enriched our hymnology with some popular hymns. He rendered important service as a member of the Welsh Hymn-book Revision Committee, contributed frequently to the Welsh periodicals, and translated into Welsh Dr. W. B. Pope's *Higher Catechism*. In 1909 he was elected President of the Welsh Assembly, the duties of which office he discharged with marked ability. He was appointed Chairman of the South Wales District in 1913, which office he held until the time of his death. He was a man of winsome disposition, sympathetic and loyal. By his holy life and rich ministry of the Word he adorned the vocation to which he belonged. He passed away in great peace on January 21, 1918, in the sixty-fifth year of his age and the forty-third of his ministry.

(28) EZEKIEL LONES: born in 1841 at Prince's End, Tipton, where he was connected with the Wesleyan church from childhood. He became a local preacher at eighteen years of age, and entered the Ministry in 1870. After three happy years at Richmond, he was appointed to Graham's Town. After sixteen years of valuable work in South Africa he returned to England in 1887. He was highly esteemed in the circuits of Yorkshire and Cornwall, not only for his powerful expository preaching, but also for his genial, tactful methods of dealing with men. His thorough knowledge of Methodist polity enabled him to overcome many difficulties. He

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was a saint and a scholar. A keen Greek and Hebrew student in his early college days, he carried the habits then formed throughout his life. Retiring from circuit work in England in 1911, he again went to South Africa, and as junior minister of the East London Circuit took charge of Cambridge Church for four years. Owing to his wife's ill-health, he came to England in 1916, to reside at St. Just, where he was an ever-welcome and popular preacher. On January 29, 1918, a few days after his seventy-seventh birthday, He whom he had so lovingly and loyally served called him to the richer life and service above.

(29) THOMAS BENNITT: born at Cowick, in the Snaith Circuit. Converted in early life, he soon received the Divine call to preach, and the call of the Church quickly followed. His mind was vigorous, and careful study combined with wide reading made him a man of great intelligence. Preaching was his great joy, and gave delight and profit to his hearers. Prolonged domestic affliction developed his natural tenderness and helped him to enter into the sorrows of his people. Retiring to Withernsea in 1908, he rendered useful service, and on February 8, 1918, at the age of seventy-five, he passed into the Unseen Presence and Service.

(30) EDWARD A. WAIN: born at Bakewell on December 21, 1837. He was converted to God in the days of his youth, and was accepted as a Candidate for the Ministry in 1859. After a period of training at Didsbury College he was appointed to the Brunswick Circuit, Liverpool. For forty-four years he did the full work of a Methodist preacher with fidelity and zeal, and was owned of God in the conversion of many. As a preacher he was evangelical, earnest, and impressive. As a superintendent he was faithful, judicious, and fearless in the discharge of duty. He was an affable and loyal colleague, and was beloved by the people. He became a Supernumerary in 1905, and rendered willing and valuable service for several years at Duffield in the Belper Circuit. He passed into the higher life on February 14, 1918, in the eighty-first year of his age and the fifty-seventh of his ministry.

(31) SAMUEL R. WILKIN: born at Porkellis, Helston, February 14, 1849, his father being a local preacher and class-leader. Converted in 1865, he began to preach two years later, and he went to Richmond College in 1870. He was sent in 1873 to South Ceylon, where he did arduous and notable service as Principal of Wesley College, Colombo, for eight years, and of Richmond College, Galle, for eight years more. In Galle he did much to train Sinhalese ministers, evangelists, and teachers. On returning to England in 1889, he continued to render devoted service. His preaching was instructive and useful. He was systematic and faithful in all pastoral duty, skilfully using his great gift of sympathy; he had a wealth of tender affection, often indeed concealed but always effectual. His was a strong faithful ministry throughout. He died with startling suddenness at Bangor, February 16, 1918, in his seventieth year and in the forty-sixth of his ministry.

(32) W. STANLEY HUNT: born of Methodist parents at Macclesfield in February 1861. He was a Candidate for our Ministry in the year 1885, being then sent to Didsbury College, and for thirty years he exercised a faithful ministry among us. In him unusual gifts were combined with

atically gave away a tenth part of his income to support the cause of God and to aid the sick and poor. Possessed of considerable energy of character, he had the courage of his convictions, which were intensely Protestant and evangelical. He is held in affectionate remembrance by many of the people of the Circuits in which he travelled. In building and renovating chapels, he showed much enterprise. During the latter years of his life he was a great sufferer. He died in peace at Evesham on October 1, 1896. Among his latest utterances was, "I am nearing the higher rounds of the ladder, and am going to be with Christ, which is—*far—far*—better." He lived the allotted "threescore years and ten," and served the Church of his choice and love for nearly fifty years.

(8) JOHN EATON: born at Birmingham in 1815. His mother was a Methodist, and when a child he was frequently taken by her to the class-meeting and other services. Early in life he went to business in Northampton, where he formed habits of early rising and perseverance which stood him in good stead in after years. For forty-six years he served Methodism laboriously and ungrudgingly in some of the hardest country Circuits. He was diligent and successful as a pastor, preacher, and administrator. His bright and sunny spirit made him an acceptable visitor in the sick-room, whilst his unwavering faith in God strengthened the confidence of those who were passing through deep waters. His preaching was expository and practical, and he ever kept in view the cardinal truths of Christianity, which he preached with evangelical fervour and power. His strong common sense, happy tact, and knowledge of our polity and discipline, made him an admirable chairman of Circuit meetings. In 1887 he became a supernumerary, residing at New Brighton. He preached his last sermon at Liscard on the text, "What are these which are arrayed in white robes?" The disease which was the immediate cause of death developed

with startling rapidity, and on the morning of October 1, 1896, he entered into rest in the eighty-first year of his age and the fifty-sixth of his ministry.

(9) EDWARD FISON: born at Thetford, in Norfolk, in 1820. The influences of a godly Methodist home led to early decision for Christ. At twelve years of age he became a member of his mother's Society class, and the promise of his youthful consecration was well fulfilled in all after life. When the call to the work of the Ministry came, he readily sacrificed bright worldly prospects, and after a course at Didsbury College received in 1845 his first appointment. Forty years of active ministry were spent for the most part in wide country Circuits, and everywhere he put conscience and heart into his work. His devout spirit, genuine "humility of mind," and cheerful kindness drew to him the hearts of the people. His preaching was evangelical, earnest, and edifying. He was a diligent student of biblical exposition and of theology. After his retirement, in 1885, until within a few months of his death, he preached almost every Sunday, and when seized with the final sickness his only sorrow was that he could work no more. His affliction was of a painful nature, but was borne with his usual patience and cheerful confidence in God. As the end approached, many expressions of unwavering trust in Christ broke from his lips, and on October 4, 1896, after giving his last messages for his children, some of whom were far away, he peacefully breathed his soul into the hands of his Redeemer, in the seventy-sixth year of his age and the fifty-second of his ministry.

X (10) JOHN SAMUEL JONES: the son of a Welsh Wesleyan minister, received his early education at Old Kingswood School. There he came under the influence of the saving grace of God, and soon after leaving school, in his sixteenth year, he began to preach. His abilities were early recognised, and it was felt that he had unquestionably a divine call to the work of the Ministry. He was accepted as a Candidate,

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and sent to Hoxton Theological Institution. He received an appointment to a Circuit when only twenty, and for over fifty-six years fulfilled his ministry, till at the time of his death he was the oldest Minister in active Circuit work. He became a member of the Legal Conference in 1881, and was one of the most prominent and useful members of the Conference. Fearless and skilful in debate, he was quick to detect and disentangle a confused argument. For more than twenty years he presided successively over the Macclesfield, Norwich and Lynn, Channel Islands, and Exeter Synods. His administration was characterised by fairness, justice, and distinguished ability. As a preacher, he was evangelical, logical, and vigorous. He was a diligent and faithful pastor, kind and sympathetic towards the young, and genial to all. He was greatly esteemed and loved in his Circuits as a man of sterling character, pious and devout. His knowledge of Methodist law and usage has been rarely equalled, and his general information was fresh, extensive, and accurate. In the building of chapels and the removal of debts he was untiring and successful. He held with tenacity the verities of the Christian faith. Nearly all his early comrades had been removed while he seemed still strong to labour. Death came suddenly. He had just reached home from Taunton,—where he had been attending a District Committee—when the finger of God gently touched him, and he fell asleep on October 15, 1896, in the seventy-sixth year of his age and the fifty-seventh of his ministry.

(11) JOHN TAIT DUNCAN: born at Noness, Shetland, in 1822. His early life was spent at Aberdeen, where home training, followed by Sunday-school instruction, led to a sound conversion to God. He afterwards removed to London, and, during his apprenticeship as a civil engineer, became a local preacher. He spent three years at Richmond College. For forty-six years he laboured in the full work of the Ministry, until failing health constrained him to become a

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Supernumerary. On his removal to Buckhurst Hill he frequently preached, and began a Bible-class for young people. During his last illness his great delight was to hear his devoted wife read the fourteenth, fifteenth, sixteenth, and seventeenth chapters of St. John's Gospel. For the last ten days of life he was more or less unconscious, then he fell into a quiet sleep, from which he never awoke. He was a faithful colleague, especially in the times of agitation and trouble, and steadfastly adhered to the Church of his choice. He had superior mental abilities, and strong individuality of character. He was acceptable and popular, both in the pulpit and on the platform. In many of his Circuits he promoted the building and renovation of chapels and schoolrooms, to all of which he liberally subscribed. The poor found him a sympathising and generous friend. He died on October 20, 1896, in the seventy-fourth year of his age.

(12) HENRY WATTS: born at Stockport on December 4, 1842, and died at Wood Green, in the Finsbury Park Circuit, on October 21, 1896. He was converted in early life, his first religious impressions being received from his widowed mother. At the age of twenty-one he went to Richmond College, and, after three years' residence there, entered upon Circuit work in 1867. After twenty years of service, ill health, which for some time had made his work exceedingly difficult, necessitated retirement. For the last nine years of his life he was unable to undertake any active duty. He was a man of humble and sincere piety, and remarkable for a meek and quiet spirit. He was a diligent student; in his work as a Minister he was painstaking and devout, and was a faithful and evangelical preacher. His illness was long and painful, but was borne without complaint. During his last hours he manifested a spirit of entire resignation to the will of God, and was kept in perfect peace.
