THE LATE MR. JAMES B. GALLOWAY.—The remains of Mr. James B. Galloway, sole partner of the firm of Messrs. Betts and Co., shipping chemists of this city, were interred on Friday last in the secluded churchyard of Roby. The deceased, who was cut off in the prime of life, was highly esteemed by a large circle of friends for his suavity of temper and uprightness of character. He held as a Mason the important position of I.P.M. in the Duke of Edinburgh Lodge, 1,182, the members of which have sustained a very serious loss in his death.
