



Mr. William Allen, K.C., the new member for the Burslem and Tunstall Division of Stoke-on-Trent, is no stranger to Westminster. In July, 1892, at the age of 22, he was elected as Gladstonian Liberal M.P. for Newcastle-under-Lyme, a seat which had been held for many years by his father, the late Mr. William Shepherd Allen, who resided at Woodhead Hall, Cheadle. At that time Mr. Allen was the youngest member of the House of Commons. He retained the seat until the "Khaki" Election of 1903, when he was defeated by the late Sir Alfred Seale Haslam, of Derby, by a majority of 92. At the time of his defeat Mr. Allen (then Capt. Allen) was on active service in the South African War. On his return from South Africa he went straight to Tunstall, which then was included in the Newcastle Division, and he received from his political supporters a welcome that was memorable for its intense enthusiasm. Later, Mr. Allen received the Freedom of the Borough of Newcastle. In 1905 he was called to the Bar and joined the Oxford Circuit, with chambers in London and Hanley. A sound lawyer, particularly on licensing and land law, Mr. Allen's judgment and fair-mindedness were recognised by the Unionist Government in his nomination as a member of the Royal Commission on Licensing. Subsequently, he took silk, and was appointed Recorder of Ludlow, a position he still holds. For some years he represented Newcastle on the Staffordshire County Council. Mr. Allen had been an eloquent defender of Free Trade throughout his political career until recently, when he announced through the Press his conversion to a policy of tariffs to meet the present industrial and economic situation. The new member, who has travelled widely, contested the Burslem seat in the 1924 election, when Mr. Andrew MacLaren defeated him by about 600 votes.
